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Be Seeing You

"Brothers and sisters, the work of an interim time, an in-between time, is to loosen our grip."

I offered up those words in my very first sermon at St. James' on September 3, 2023. I talked that day about Simon Peter and his insistence on maintaining the status quo because he was terrified at the prospect of Jesus having to suffer and die. Jesus, however, rebukes Simon Peter and even calls him Satan; that is, an adversary. Maintaining the status quo ain't Jesus' style. He understood the movement of the Spirit and God's ever-unfolding dream for the world, which is all about discernment that leads to transformation.

There's that word again! Discernment. We use it a lot in the Church, most often for those entering the ordination process, but the truth is that discernment is a gift God gives to all of us. Each day is an opportunity to discern, to listen for where the Spirit is leading us, to find, as Frederick Beuchner once wrote "where your deepest desire and the world's deepest need intersect." On that warm late summer's day on the lakeside, I invited y'all to accept the Spirit's invitation to discern who it was that God was calling you to be, to discover your deepest hopes and dreams as the Body of Christ in this time and place, and to not only be transformed by that holy work but to listen for who was being called to join you in it.

You accepted that invitation, St. James', and you've done the work! I am extremely proud of your Search Committee and Vestry, who have called a priest to serve among you with grace, wisdom, and humor. I am grateful to Marcia Watt and Colleen Gannon, the Search chairs, whose patient listening during the Office Hours sessions led to the creation of the best parish profile I have ever seen! I also wish to thank Susanne Rynkiewicz, Bill Spalding, and Doug Smith, who have served as Wardens during this interim time and guided the Vestry through their own discernment and led them to firmly and confidently issue the call. Well done, thou good and faithful servants!

One of the greatest gifts of this parish is your staff. They make the job of your priests so much easier! Thank you to Nicole Bova, who transitioned into a brand new role as Parish Administrator during this time and has been phenomenal at it. To Mo Allyn for their courage in preaching and for the wisdom, intentionality, and gentleness they bring to teaching - the Church needs more like you! To Justin Oei, for agreeing to bring back the Easter Vigil this year, and for using your talents to introduce Evensong to St. James' - you're a gift! To Michael Larkin for your dedication to leading the St. James' Praise Band and collaboration on combined worship. To Nick Kilkenny and all the Tech Team volunteers, who put in so much work behind the scenes to make online worship run smoothly. To Deacon Chuck Stewart, for proving once again that deacons are the model and inspiration for us all. To Laura Posecznick, for, well, everything you do to make this church run - take good care of yourself and let others do the same! And to the unsung heroine of St. James', Nancy Graham, whose incredible love for the people of this parish has moved me on more occasions than I can count – every single church needs a Nancy Graham!

When I was approached by (then-Canon, now-Bishop) Carrie Schofield-Broadbent to serve amongst you as Interim Rector I was hesitant. Nothing personal, I swear! Having been a part of an interim staff before, I knew how hard this work could be. Who was I to follow a much beloved Rector and lead a staff and congregation through their season

of grief and growth? That's actually how I knew this was a call from God! Too often in my own life those things at which I first balked turned out to be exactly where God was calling me to be. What an incredible gift this interim time has been! Truly, St. James' was a healing balm for Kristen and me in ways that you will never know, and we are both so very appreciative to all of you for welcoming us into your homes, your church, and your lives.



As one season ends another begins. My prayer is that you will carry the lessons learned during this interim time, from the good work and insights of Holy Conversations to the realization that you can, in fact, change, and that God is still praised and you're still ok. Welcome Mother Pillar as you welcomed Kristen and me. Love her and her family as you loved us, and let them love you back!

As I've said in the past, all priests are interims. It's just a matter of how long we stay. Whether it's one year or 20, all priests eventually do leave. But the people, the Body of Christ, remain. Remember who you are and whose you are. Love fiercely, serve the poor, preach with abandon, and in all things trust in the One who has called you into this community of faith, and who is transforming you more and more into the likeness of Christ.

The Episcopal Church is, after all, a small church. No doubt our paths will cross again one day, so I will not say goodbye. Rather, I offer this one final blessing:

May the road rise to meet you.

May the wind be always at your back.

May the rains fall soft upon your fields,
and the sun shine warm upon your face.

And until we meet again,
may you be held in the palm of God's hand.




TABLE TOP FELLOWSHIP! (aka Foyer Groups) will be starting again in the fall - Hooray!





Letter from Miss Mo, Director of Children, Youth & Family Ministries

Hi, everyone!

I've enjoyed getting to know the families at St. James. I look forward to continuing to be in the communitywith you all. Through this transition, I am again grateful for Laura's groundwork for our children and youth. I look forward to working closely with Mother Pilar on all the new programming. For now, though, please look at all the exciting existing programming coming up!

On August 28, we will head to First Presbyterian Church for a Jonah and the Whale-themed Stay-cation Bible School. This program is perfect for elementary-age students and their families, offering an excellent opportunity for spiritual growth and fun. Parents can drop their children off at 5:00 p.m. and pick them up at 7:00 p.m.



We will kick off our Sunday school year on September 8 with Mini-Saints and Saints in Training at 9:00 a.m. and a brunch at 10:00 a.m.

This year, our Mini-Saints and Saints in Training (SIT) programs will explore the lives and teachings of Jesus, the disciples, and the saints to inspire children to live out their faith daily. The programs will be held from 9:00 to 9:45 a.m., focusing on specific weekly themes and concluding with communion. Additionally, our youth have been invited to join the First Presbyterian Youth Group, which provides an opportunity for community building on Sunday evenings at the First Presbyterian Church. More details to come!

In October, we have exciting Halloween activities planned for all ages. The Stay-cation Bible School Harvest Party at First Presbyterian Church is designed for our elementary children, offering fun and safe festivities. Our youth group will also head to Auburn for a trunk-or-treat event, followed by movies and a pizza night at St. James. These activities are not just about having fun but also about building a strong sense of community. For the Stay-cation Bible School schedule, we have the following dates: October 6 for "Jesus Visits Mary and Martha," October 13 is a break (Indigenous People's Day), October 20 for "Jesus Heals a Disabled Woman," and October 27 for "Jesus Heals a Blind Man."

On All Saints Sunday, Miss Mo will organize a unique program for adults and children at the Saints-in-Training class. If you want to present a saint to the class, you can contact Miss Mo. For example, this year, Miss Mo will share about Joan of Arc, offering an inspiring and educational experience to deepen the children's understanding of the saints. The schedule for the Saints-in-Training class is as follows: November 3 will feature activities and stories about saints; November 10, there will be no class in observance of Veterans Day; November 17 will focus on the parables of the Lost Sheep and Lost Coin; and finally, on November 24, the class will explore the Parable of the Prodigal Son.

In December, we have a lot to look forward to! We will start our Lenten Study series, offering meaningful sessions to prepare our hearts for Christmas. Our Christmas Pageant will be a joyous celebration with community participation and festive cheer. Mo's private lesson students will perform the prelude, setting a delightful tone for the live pageant. We have multiple rehearsals to ensure everyone is well-prepared, and beautiful costumes will bring the nativity story to life. Please confirm your participation so we can provide you with the details.

Additionally, our youth will serve as acolytes at the kids' service, adding a special touch to the event. Let's make this Christmas one to remember! Finally, please remember that on December 29, there will be no class due to the Christmas and New Year holidays.

Planning for the 2025 school year is already underway.

The upcoming programming will provide enriching and spiritually rewarding experiences for children, youth, and their families. I am genuinely excited about the opportunities for community building and personal growth. Thank you for your ongoing support and enthusiasm as we embark on this journey together. A New Approach for October's Month of Community Service

Starting Oct. 4, "Giving with a Purpose" will address specific local needs

During the month of October, we will focus on the needs of the Skaneateles Food Pantry clients. Each month, the pantry serves 85

to 90 families or households. It is open Tuesday mornings and Thursday evenings. These households must live in the Skaneateles Central School District and may visit the pantry once per week. Just more than 30% of the families served are Spanish-speaking, primarily workers at local dairy farms. Other groups of



food pantry clients: elderly individuals, including several veterans, and families with young children.

Each Sunday, we ask that the congregation bring one of the following items:

- Canned Black Beans
- Canned Fruit
- 2 pound bag of white rice (not instant)
- 32 oz bottle of vegetable oil
- Maseca, (Walnart's Great Vaule brand Masa Instantanea de Maiz)
- Box of Pasta

Simply bring your donation to the front of the church, before or after service, and place in the baskets provided.

Tops Market provides day-old bakery items, and meat, poultry, and dairy products near their expiration date. During the growing season, local farmers donate produce. Other Items are donated through annual food drives sponsored by the Scouts, Rotary Club, and postal carriers or collected by local churches, such as St. James'. The food pantry also purchases non-perishable foods from the Central New York Food Bank, Amazon, Walmart, and dollar stores.

Auburn Soup Kitchen Celebrates 20 years by Corinne Buterbaugh

In 2004, Saints Peter and John Episcopal Church opened its doors to feed the hungry of Auburn every Saturday noon. Former parishioner Ginny Stehle jumped in, recruiting St. James parishioners, colleagues at (then) Welch Allyn, and even her sisters to help. She was so successful at enlisting volunteers that, before long, St. James' was asked to work the last Saturday of every month because it usually sees the largest number of patrons. When Ginny moved to North Carolina a few years later, she asked Corinne Buterbaugh to take over organizing the St. James' crew. Things hummed along—with St. James' providing about 10 volunteers each month—until March 2020.

COVID significantly increased the need for meals, and Sts. Peter and John expanded from one day a week to four: Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Saturday. The soup kitchen also switched from serving lunch in the parish hall to preparing "to go" meals. In 2023, they served 38,411 meals. Community support remains strong. Bakeries and grocers donate breads and pastries, and the soup kitchen works with the Food Bank of CNY to obtain reasonably priced food. Local foundations, companies, churches, and individuals provide financial support.

In addition to supplying volunteers, St. James' donates to the soup kitchen from its outreach budget and through the St. James' Thrift Shop. We have also collected items, such as cleaning supplies, for the soup kitchen during past community service months. Volunteers find it incredibly rewarding to help neighbors in need, whether they are senior citizens, families with young children, individuals struggling with mental illness or addiction, or others. Since 2004, more than 80 St. James' parishioners have volunteered at the soup kitchen.

Here are just a few memories of St. James' parishioners at the soup kitchen:

- Jim Brown serving patrons an extra slice of tomato in their salad because he remembered certain individuals really like tomatoes.
- Gay Hembach handing out pears picked from trees growing in the yard of the late Mimi Bryan.
- Mark Kulik, Dan Pajak, the late Brad Wirth, and others upping the culinary quality of the menus.
- The late Bob Morse opening countless cans with the industrial opener but refusing to have anything to do with canned beets.



Did You Know? By Emma Cowley

Did You Know? As Labor Day approaches, let's honor and recognize 8 Black Women Labor Leaders who improved working conditions, wages, and rights for America's workers, frequently at significant personal sacrifice. For decades, Black women have led the fight for labor rights, improving conditions for all American workers. Historically excluded from many well-paying jobs, they have taken on much of the essential yet difficult work that supports our economy, often without the protections other workers receive.

Dorothy Boulder: In 1968, she established the National Domestic Workers Union, organizing these workers on an unprecedented scale in the U.S. The union educated workers on how to negotiate for higher wages, vacation time, and other benefits. She also mandated that all members register to vote, giving them a stronger voice both in their workplaces and in Georgia's policy decisions.

Nannie Helen Burroughs: As a suffragist, educator, and organizer, and a mentor to Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., she merged labor reform with the voting rights movement. In 1921, she created the National Association of Wage Earners, a labor union for Black domestic workers. Additionally, she founded the National Trade School for Women and Girls to combat labor exploitation through education, enhancing working conditions and expanding career opportunities for Black women.

Melnea Cass: Often referred to as the "First Lady of Roxbury," community organizer and activist, she offered social services, professional training, and labor rights education to empower Boston's most vulnerable workers.

Clara Day: As an information clerk at Montgomery Ward, she was frustrated by the segregation of white and Black employees, which motivated her to seek change. Clara Day started organizing her co-workers at Montgomery Ward in 1953 and subsequently took on several roles with Teamsters Local 743. She was also instrumental in founding the Coalition of Labor Union Women and the Teamsters National Black Caucus.

Anna Arnold Hedgeman: A civil rights activist, educator and writer who helped organize the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom, she advocated for equal opportunity and employment.





Dora Lee Jones: Dora Lee Jones helped found the Domestic Workers Union in Harlem in 1934 in defiance of New York City's "slave markets".

Maida Springer Kemp: Kemp, a labor organizer in the garment industry, made history in 1945 as the first Black woman to represent the U.S. labor movement internationally. She remained dedicated to advocating for civil rights and women's rights throughout her life, both in America and abroad.

Rosina Corrothers Tucker: Tucker helped establish the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, the nation's first predominantly Black labor union along with The International Ladies' Auxiliary Order.



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Say It with Flowers - Altar Flowers, that is!

After the last service each Sunday, Margie Amberge rearranges the flowers into smaller arrangements that are taken to parishioners who are ill, experiencing difficulties or loss, or celebrating a milestone.

Serving on Altar Guild is a highly rewarding ministry. Because members work in teams, it's also a great way to get to know people.

Want a no-obligation way to see if Altar Guild is something you'd be interested in? We invite you to shadow an Altar Guild team for about 90 minutes one weekend this fall to learn more.

Each year, our devoted Altar Guild members prepare the altar for more than 220 services. This involves setting the altar and credence table, filling candles with liquid paraffin, washing and ironing linens, and other behind-the-scenes but essential tasks.

Team members generally serve on Saturday mornings (once a month – for about 45 minutes, usually beginning at 8:30) and one Sunday morning a month – before or after the service they normally attend. You don't have to switch services (unless you want to!).

Each team is responsible for one weekend a month. Total time commitment is no more

than 90 minutes a month. We are FLEXIBLE. Several members are away for the winter.

As our current Altar Guild members age, the next generation of men and women must step up.
